Year 9 Million Makers raise money for the Prince's Trust

At the end of last term Year 9 students spent lessons and lunchtimes organising and running fundraising activities to help The Prince's Trust charity. The Prince's Trust helps young people aged 14 to 30 to develop their confidence and skills, and to get into education, training and employment.

Following the success of last year's project, Year 9 students again took part in the Million Makers initiative which allows small groups of students to think of their own business plans to raise funds through mini enterprises within school.

The students spent PSHCE (Personal Social Health and Citizenship Education) lessons developing their ideas. The initiative culminated in every group of students putting their business plan into practice by running a lunchtime fundraising stall. The variety of fundraising activities ranged from cake sales, a smoothie and ice cream bar, through X-Box competitions and car washing to designer T-shirts and henna designs. The amount of money raised was an impressive £1342.54.



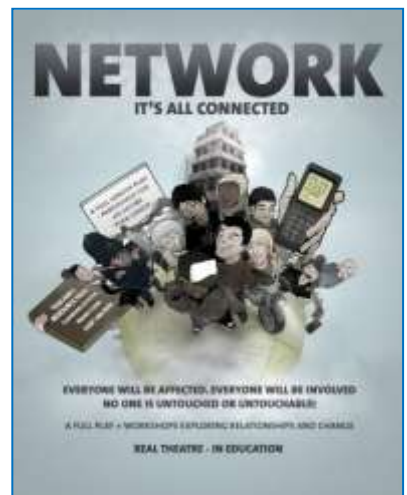

As well as the PHSCE activities (above) enjoyed by Years 8 and 10, visiting speakers brought their expertise and skills to bear in a variety of other sessions for the different Year groups.



Year 11 – Science Day

The Year 11 students had the opportunity to work with a company based at Loughborough University. They experienced the latest sports technology to examine forces, friction, speed, and reaction time using equipment used by the Institute of Sport on top athletes around the country such as rowing machines, reaction boards, a kicking cage and light cameras. Both staff and students alike got involved, helping to enable the students to understand scientific concepts and relate them to everyday life.



Students also worked at constructing Solar Powered buggies, using their knowledge of circuits, and then timed their buggies across a speed tack under Halogen lights, as well as designing the most accurate catapult. Well done 11N – Champions across the activities.

Year 9 – World War I

On an unseasonably hot day in September, the Year 9s immersed themselves in the lives of World War I soldiers. The person who probably felt the heat the most though was our 'guest star' Corporal Knight. He was dressed (as usual) in his full Khaki kit made from worsted wool, and for those lucky few that got to try on some of the kit they will agree that it certainly would have kept the soldiers unpleasantly warm in the heat of the summer in a Belgian or French trench.



Corporal Knight has been the highlight of this CED day over the past few years, and again this year he did not disappoint. There were plenty of "oo's", "ahh's" as he described the experiences of the men as they struggled to stay alive in the trenches. His enthralling stories were further brought to life by the many fascinating objects that he displayed and demonstrated (to a safe degree!), some of which he had made. When he is not giving talks at schools, he also makes uniforms for stage and screen productions eg War Horse and even appears in them: look out for him in Downton Abbey! The artefacts ranged from the medieval-style trench clubs that were used for hand to hand fighting to greatcoats that soaked up the mud like sponges. It was also fascinating to see the development of objects that we think would be common in the war, such as a gas mask (which evolved from soaking a sock in urine to counter the acid of the mustard gas).

In the classroom the students worked in groups to research the lives of 13 soldiers from St Albans. They examined the census returns for them from 1901 and 1911 to find out about their lives before they joined the army. There was a real range of people from the working class to the more privileged, but the one thing that they had in common was being amongst the 640 plus men that St Albans lost as a result of the Great War. Students were especially interested as many of their homes and memorials to them still exist today; as a consequence, many students developed a great sense of empathy, gaining an insight into the reality of the loss that the families of St Albans felt throughout the war years.

Special thanks to the whole History Department for working across the day to deliver the lessons, Miss Greenwood, Mrs Vine, Mrs Crisp, Mr Robinson, Miss Green and Ellie Rice for supporting in the lessons and Mrs Powdrell for the organisation of the day and contributions towards this activity.

All Year 7 pupils enjoyed testing the speed of the river using dog biscuits and learning how to do fieldwork. There were some amazing Wellies worn on the day and everyone had a wonderful time learning by doing. Their experience from the day will help the Year 7 students in their Rivers and Flooding Unit Assessment next term.

Some of the fieldwork highlights from the day included measuring the depth, width and angle of the river at three sites in Wheathampstead, and measuring the size of pebbles at various points in the river. Many practised their field sketching abilities whilst on the banks of the river and will use their results to inform their assessment answers after half term.



Awesome work was accomplished by all and a really big well done must be said to all the Year 7s - especially as none managed to float away on the day!

Another involved facts being read out whilst distracting things happened and we had to focus on what was being said. Then we had to make a crest for the Italian football team in a few minutes, following instructions in Italian. The final task was about pictures eg looking at two pictures and spotting the difference, or having to remember as much as possible of a picture having only seen it for a couple of seconds.'

Learning Support

The SEN department continues to work to address issues to enable all Beaumont pupils to access the curriculum.

A main focus in Lower School is developing literacy skills and in the Upper School supporting Options at Key Stage 4 and above and accessing the curriculum and exams.

We run the ASDAN Award Programme at Key Stage 4, a skills based modular scheme, and recently had successful visits to the Waterdale Transfer Station and Hollywood Bowl researching local community and leisure facilities.

The SEN department runs Social Skills programmes, supports schools visits and residential trips, implements physiotherapy under the guidance of trained physiotherapists and takes some students swimming as part of their PE programme.

The SEN department supports a wide range of special needs and strives to promote professional development through training and shared experience including using Evac chairs, supporting pupils with visual impairment, to developing Specific Learning Disability support and even driving the minibus.

This summer, having studied for a year in addition to working in the SEN department, Mr Bratley gained his Specialist Teaching Assistant Diploma from the University of Hertfordshire and along with Mr Wilsher, PE teacher, was awarded a splendid shield in recognition of his outstanding contribution to Disability Sport from the St Albans and Harpenden Sports Partnership.

Boccia, a game similar to Bowls, Petanque or even French Boules which was originally developed for athletes in wheelchairs, continues to be a successful sport at Beaumont and the team had a very successful summer winning the Lords Taverners' Under 19's Tournament and coming third in the county.

Governor News

The Governing Body was delighted with the exam results this year at Beaumont. At GCSE 80% of students achieved 5A* - C including English and Maths, compared with the national average of between 50 and 55%. Of the whole cohort, 78% achieved 9 GCSEs and 73% achieved 10 A* - C including English and Maths. Congratulations to all our students!

Work is progressing to provide much better playing fields and school buildings. The joint work with Herts County Council is complex but proceeding well. There will be more details when we are certain of exactly when it will all happen!

Governors discussed the budget in the current year and also the prospects for the future. We anticipate the financial outlook continuing to be tough. Nonetheless we are very confident about the future of Beaumont and have no doubt that it will remain an excellent school!

At our last meeting we talked again about the issue of Academy status, which has been commented on frequently in editions of Beaumont Life before. This is inextricably tied up with our Field, Access and Buildings (FAB) project. Once we are clear about the timescale for this, Governors will be able to consider making a decision on the question of Academy status.

Governors also talked about how they should make visits to the school. Of course Governors frequently visit the school already for meetings. We recognise the importance of all Governors seeing the school, talking to staff and students and also being seen. We would like to link such visits to departments of the school, so that Governors become more familiar with all parts of the school in greater depth. We need to finalise the details of this and feel that this would be a very valuable advance.

Finally please have a look at the text about the work of the Governing Body on the school website. Click on "About Us" and then again, on the drop down menu, at "Governing Body". This explains the work of the Governing Body and also has biographies of all our Governors. I am very proud of the expertise at the service of the school, so please do have a look!

Did you know.....

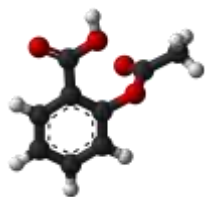
That 2011 is the international year of Chemistry? But what exactly do chemists do you may ask and what use are chemists anyway? Chemists today try to meet the global challenges of:

Clean air **Safe water** **Eco-friendly products** **Sustainable energy**
Healthy food **Dependable medicines**



Key Stage 5 – A Level Chemistry

Chemistry is seen as the central science that links together Biology and Physics. It is a prerequisite for many university courses including Medicine, Dentistry and Veterinary Sciences. This course helps A-level students not only develop their practical and technical skills, but also gain a better understanding of the world around them. Over the course students will carry out experiments such as making soap, flame tests, burning alcohols, making paracetamol, and also synthesising '2-ethanoxybenzoic acid' (aspirin to you!)

Key Stage 4 – GCSE

Chemistry is important in every day life to help us understand the nature of the many materials we use, such as plastics, fuels and metals. We can find out how substances are made up and how chemical reactions can change things. At GCSE we place emphasis on 'How Science Works', which means not just learning theory but understanding the practical side of science and its relation to the world in which we live.

Our itinerary this term includes guest speakers, master classes run by experienced science teachers and preparation for pupils to undertake projects that will allow them to gain a Bronze CREST award for science. It is an exciting opportunity for pupils who have shown a keen interest in Science to investigate research and learn more about the opportunities within the science world. If any parents (or contacts) are scientists we would be very keen to hear from you. If you think you would be able to spare an hour to talk to the children about your work/interest in science then we would love to invite you into school to share your knowledge and expertise with them.

We are also keen to apply for a Partnership Grant from the Royal Society that would allow students to work on projects with a partner scientist. The scientist (or engineer) must be actively engaged in science or engineering research, development, production or service.

What the students think about chemistry.....

In chemistry, we investigate the structure and bonding of atoms which help us to understand the chemical reactions between molecules. This is especially important for organic chemistry, the study of chains of carbon atoms. I find it particularly interesting since the same atoms can form so many different compounds. It is also relevant in the world today, because our plastics, fossil fuels and many of our medicines are organic molecules.

Experiments are one of the most enjoyable parts of chemistry. They not only help us to improve our practical skills, but they also help us to consolidate the theoretical work we have done. We do a variety of experiments such as performing titrations to determine the concentration of a solution, making aspirin and measuring heat (enthalpy) changes of chemical reactions. It is always fun to burn magnesium or make slime (and we have done both), but it is also interesting to understand the chemistry behind these reactions.

Studying A-level chemistry can open up a wide range of possible careers. Not all chemists work in a laboratory and chemistry is important for medicine and for many fields of scientific research, both on its own and in conjunction with other subjects. Chemistry at A-level is fun and rewarding but you do need to put in the effort to get the best out of it.
